The organiser Savas Ertufan (*right*) kindly took time out of his busy schedule to explain why this tournament means so much to him and why he chose the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the tournament to choose the theme of Peace.

'What does this tournament mean to you?'

'To me personally, it started as a hobby, from the very first time as a participant, then being asked to assist with the organisation. I do this voluntarily and it takes a whole year to prepare.

'Why have you chosen to promote the theme of peace throughout the tournament?'

'Peace is what human beings need nowadays. Maybe in England you do not feel it, but in Turkey and the Middle East, you feel it every day. Turkey borders Iraq and Syria



which is approximately 900 km away and each day brings unrest and many people coming across the border to escape the war. There were three players who could not travel to the tournament due to the conflict and that's where the idea came from. Sport brings people together from different cultures and creates new friends. Therefore every occasion should be used positively to promote peace.'

'How has the tournament changed over 20 years?'

'Well, it grew quite gradually, but in the first 10 years, we had some positive growth. In the last six years, we have had quite a steady growth with a good team of helpers and fantastic hotels in

Antalya which we have a contract with. They assist us a lot as it is a very important event for them. Almost 400 people from the north of Turkey choose to stay for 2 weeks and bring their families too.'

'What do you hope the players take away from this year's tournament?'

'I hope they take away new friends, reacquaint with old friends, enjoy their time in a lovely environment and country, enjoy the weather and time with their families.'

Irish eyes were smiling for one of our most successful and popular members, Dublin-based Teresa Devaney who won Gold and Silver in the Over 60s singles and doubles (with Russian partner, Larissa Ilinskaya), as well as the open 'fun' O/60s singles event on the first day.

'Yes, I am going to change it by deed poll, so I can get my rankings sorted out to reflect the win. Obviously I'll get more points and improve my ranking. I will definitely change it.



'What was your greatest achievement of the tournament?'

'Beating my hero Janos. I like his lifestyle....eating, drinking, eating and drinking. When he told me that's how he prepared for the tournament, I followed suit. He thought I would be beaten, but the new fitness regime obviously worked. Beating Janos was the best ever win I have achieved and I will live off this victory for the next 30 years! If anyone says anything to me, my reply will be 'Well you haven't beaten Janos Takacs!'

'How did your fans help you to victory?

Well they thought I had no chance, but I proved them all wrong. Their support was great and gave me lots of encouragement; the Mexican Wave at the semi-finals was a real highlight'.

'Finally, what makes you come to this tournament?'

'It's a very friendly tournament. The players are great and the tournament has a good social side to it, which does attract me to it......and I just love beating the Russians. I have made a lot of friends; I meet some of them only at this tournament. The social side is just fantastic and being able to combine the tournament with a holiday is just fabulous. '
